

Fred Sjöberg Sweden

Swedish conductor Fred Sjöberg is a gifted musician in a wide variety of genres and styles. He studied voice and choral conducting at the Royal Academy of Music in Stockholm and Örebro and with renowned choral leaders such as Eric Ericson and Helmuth Rilling. In 2000, Fred was awarded "Conductor of the Year" in Sweden. He has conducted the World Youth Choir (IFCM), the World Chamber Choir (IFCM) and the European Youth Choir (Europa Cantat).



From 1997-2004 Fred Sjöberg was Music Director and conductor of the project "Notes for Millions" which produced concerts all over Sweden, each year culminating in a gala concert at the Globe Arena in Stockholm with a mass choir of over 4000 singers, orchestra and soloists. The project also organized choral competitions and national TV-shows. From 2000- 2004 he was the Music Director of the Swedish Choral Centre at the Swedish Concert Institute and from 2005-2006 the Artistic Director of Lund International Choral Festival.

Mr Sjöberg is Vice President of the International Federation for Choral Music, as well as Europa Cantat and since 2001 Secretary of the Eric Ericson Foundation. Fred Sjöberg is director of the Swedish International Choral Center Orebro and principal conductor of the French National Youth Choir.



Arthur Arnold The Netherlands

Arthur Arnold is "one of the rare conductors that not only possesses a flawless technique, but also is capable of inspiring the orchestra while giving the individual musicians creative freedom." (Shalom News Moscow). Arnold made his debut with Moscow Symphony Orchestra in the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam during the summer of 2001. It resulted in great reviews and an immediate encore invitation for both Arnold and the

orchestra a mere two weeks later.

Soon after the achievement in Amsterdam, Arnold was appointed principal guest conductor of Moscow Symphony Orchestra. In addition to ongoing

partnerships in Russia, The Netherlands, South Korea and Canada, Arnold frequents Romania where he conducts Transylvania State Philharmonic Orchestra and Targu Mures State Philharmonic Orchestra. His conducting career has taken him to Italy, Great Britain and Poland. In the United States, he conducted performances at Woodstock Mozart Festival in Illinois and has been invited back to open their 2010 season. Among other scheduled engagements this year are a range of concerts with Moscow Symphony Orchestra and a return engagement with Podlasie Orchestra and Opera in Poland.

Mr Arnold is Music Director and Conductor of the Symphony Orchestra Academy of the Pacific.



Gunnel Sjöberg Sweden

Gunnel Sjöberg received her training as a singing teacher from the School of Music at the University of Örebro. She has also studied at the Royal University College of Music in Stockholm.

Ms Sjöberg is a frequent soloist in such works as the St John Passion, the St Matthew Passion and the Christmas Oratorio of Bach and the Requiems of Mozart and Fauré.

She has also appeared in several TV shows and concerts. Ms Sjöberg performs a wide range of repertoire; however, baroque music is closest to her heart.

Gunnel has worked with such renowned conductors as Eric Ericson, Robert Sund, Helmuth Rilling and Nikolaus Harnoncourt. She is the vocal coach for the French National Youth Choir. Gunnel and Fred Sjöberg founded the Swedish International Choral Center Örebro (SWICCO).

Tobin Stokes CANADA

Tobin is originally from Powell River and has been premiering commissioned compositions with the Powell River Academy of Music since 1990.

From single choir works to fully staged productions with massed choirs and orchestra, his affiliation with both Kathaumixw and the Symphony Orchestra Academy of the Pacific (SOAP) has been fruitful. His commissioned works for the academy's choirs have led to premieres in Venezuela, the Czech Republic, Sweden, Mexico, France, and England.



From years of experience as a performer in many genres, Tobin is comfortable working in a variety of styles. He is a prolific composer for film, theatre,

opera, orchestra, chamber ensembles, and large events. His music for television has aired on all the Canadian networks. He has been commissioned by CBC, Ballet British Columbia, the 2010 Olympic Bid, the BC Choral Federation, the Victoria Symphony, the Vancouver Youth Symphony, The XV Commonwealth Games, and many others.

After living in Vancouver, Toronto, the Gulf Islands, and Montreal, Tobin returned to the west coast of Canada. He lives in Victoria, B.C. with his family, where he was recently a Composer-In-Residence with the Victoria Symphony.

Ay-Laung Wang CANADA

Ellen Ay-Laung Wang is an active organ recitalist, conductor, adjudicator and teacher. Her outstanding musicianship, brilliant technique, and great personal charm make her a favorite with audiences and congregations wherever she performs. Currently Ms Wang is principal organist for the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra and First Baptist Church. Ellen is a member of the faculty of Trinity Western University and Assistant Conductor for the acclaimed TWU Chamber and Concert Choirs.



Ms Wang was featured on CBC national television program of the Easter Sunrise Celebration of 2004 and the nationally televised memorial service for Sgt. "Smokey" Smith, the last surviving Canadian recipient of the Victoria Cross. She has accompanied the Taipei Christian Children's Chorus in concert at the Vatican and has performed for the renowned composer Fu Yu-Lin on national television in Taiwan. Ms Wang performs frequently in Festival Vancouver, and is a member of "Fanfares N' Fugues", a trumpet and organ trio.

Dr Larry Nickel Canada

Dr Larry Nickel, an Associate Composer of the Canadian Music Centre, is a busy choral clinician and sings bass in the Vancouver Chamber Choir. In 2003 Larry



took a leave from 25 years of teaching music and drama to complete a Doctorate in Composition. His thesis, Requiem for Peace, is an extensive work for chorus and symphony orchestra in twelve languages. It received a second performance at the Orpheum in 2009 with the VSO and the Vancouver Bach Choir.

Larry is co-founder and composer-in-residence for the West Coast Mennonite Chamber Choir, which has recorded over 120 of Larry's compositions on thirteen CDs. Published by Cypress, Shawnee, Classica, Pavane, Canadian International, G. Schirmer and Oxford University Press, Larry's music is presented around the world with recent performances in Toronto, Kiev, Tokyo, Melbourne, Cape Town, and Taipei. Larry is the new owner of Cypress Choral Music Publishing, which specializes in promoting Canadian composers.

Chad Louwerse Canada

Chad Louwerse is poised to take his place among the most important bass-baritones of his generation. He debuted in Europe with l'Opéra National du Rhin in Strasbourg as Bernadino in Berlioz' Benvenuto Cellini and in Canada has been heard from Quebec to British Columbia. With the Montreal Opera, he starred as Boniface in Haydn's Il Mondo Della Luna, sang Talpa in Il Tabarro and covered Leporello in Don Govanni. As a member of Mon-



treal Opera's Atelier Lyrique, he was singled out by Gingras of La Presse in Chabrier's L'Etoile, who stated that "for pure comedy, first distinction goes to Chad Louwerse".

In 2007-2008 he sang Capulet in Roméo et Juliette with the Montreal Opera and the Bonze in Madama Butterfly with Pacific Opera Victoria. In 2008-2009, he was in Vancouver for Artesia in Eugene Onegin, a Nazarene in Salome and Monterone in Rigoletto and was also heard as Hortensius in Edmonton Opera's La Fille du Regiment and as Palemon in Thaïs for Pacific Opera Victoria. Highlights of the 2009-2010 season include The Rake's Progress for Pacific Opera Victoria, Alidoro in Cenerentola and as bass soloist in Johannes Passion for the Calgary Philharmonic.



Megan Skidmore Canada

Megan Skidmore received her Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Voice Performance from McGill University. She continued her studies at the Wiener Meisterkurze in Vienna, the Mozarteum in Salzburg and the Franz Schubert Institut in Baden bei Wien.

While in Montreal she had great success as Feu and Rossignol in L'Enfant et les Sortilèges, Cunegonde in Candide and Sara Riel in Louis Riel with Opera McGill. She also performed the title role in Princess



HOST CHOIRS

Academy Chamber Choir

The Academy Chamber Choir consists of 36 singers from a wide variety of backgrounds and professions. It is an amateur choir that, since its inception



in 1994, has developed into one of Canada's dynamic chamber choirs. The choir specializes in a cappella music from the Middle Ages to the 20th century and regularly commissions new works by Canadian composers. Under the direction of Don James, the Academy Chamber Choir has toured in Venezuela, the Czech Republic, Canada, Mexico, Spain and France.

DON JAMES, CM

Don James, CM is founder and music director of the Powell River Academy of Music, the International Choral Kathaumixw and the Symphony Orchestra Academy of the Pacific. While completing his studies in orchestral conducting at the University of Washington, his work in opera led to an intense interest in vocal music. Under his direction, Academy choirs have been awarded prizes and recogni-



tion from the Canadian and European Broadcasting Corporations and have been heard in concert and on radio and television in the Americas, Asia and Europe. Recently Mr James was named Canada's representative to the International Choir Olympic Council. In 1990, Mr James was appointed a Member of the Order of Canada for his distinguished service to choral music.

Powell River Youth Choir

The Powell River Youth Choir is a thirty voice mixed choir with members ranging in age from 15 to 18. The choir specializes in a cappella music from



the Middle Ages to the 20th century and regularly commissions new works by Canadian composers. The Powell River Youth Choir frequently collaborates with soloists, instrumentalists and other choirs in the performance of major choral works. The choir has won prizes in the CBC National Amateur Choir Competition and in international, regional and provincial festivals. The Powell River Youth Choir has given concerts in North America, Mexico, Germany, Austria, Hungary, Finland, Russia, Denmark, France and Italy singing in major festivals and concert halls. Their concert tours have included Europa Cantats in Strasburg, France 1985, Vittoria, Spain 1991, Herning, Denmark 1994, Linz, Austria 1997, Arnum, Netherlands 2000, Barcelona, Spain, 2003 and in 2005 Singing Week in Bent Belgium.

PAUL CUMMINGS

Paul Cummings is a graduate of the University of British Columbia and Western Washington University where he received his Master of Music in choral conducting. Mr Cummings teaches vocal and instrumental music at Brooks Secondary School and the Powell River Academy of Music. He is an accomplished instrumentalist and singer and has been the director of the highly successful

BC Vocal Jazz Festival. In 1995 Mr Cummings received the Outstanding Music Educators Award from the British Columbia Music Educators Association.

Academy Singers

The Academy Singers began as an opportunity of advanced singers in the Boys & Girls choirs to perform repertoire with orchestra and contemporary music



not usually sung by young choirs. They have been guests at several important music, cultural and political events including the "Celebration for Peace" as guest of the City of Hiroshima and UNESCO, the 50th Anniversary of the

founding of the United Nations San Francisco, USA), Europa Cantat (Strasbourg), International Sympaati (Espoo, Finland) and the Golden Gate International Children's Choir Festival (USA) The Academy Singers have been important ambassadors for Powell River.

WALTER MARTELLA

A charter member of the Powell River Boys Choir, Walter Martella has returned to his hometown of Powell River to conduct choirs, teach music and to continue

his performing career. A graduate of the University of Victoria, Mr Martella furthered his conducting studies with Don James and Dr Elmer Iseler. Mr Martella is an accomplished trumpet soloist and jazz pianist. As well as conducting the Powell River Boys Choir and Academy Singers he also is the conductor the Powell River Chorus and the Powell River Community Band.

Powell River Boys Choir

Beginning with a young boys' choir in 1975, the Academy Choirs have reached out to the world through concert tours, recordings, radio and televi-



sion broadcasts sharing their music with enthusiastic audiences. Then under the direction of Don James, the Powell River Boys Choir sang at the XIV International Society of Music Education conference in Warsaw, Poland, the International Eisteddfod (Wales) and has toured in Germany, Poland, Austria, England, Canada, Mexico and the USA. Powell River Boys Choir have won many prestigious awards including first and second prizes in the CBC National Amateur Choir Competition in Children's Choir and Contemporary Music categories and have been finalist in the European Broadcast Corporation's "Let the People Sing" competition. Walter Martella has led the Boys Choir since 1993.

Powell River Girls Choir

The Powell River Girls Choir was formed in 1977 as a "sister choir" to the now famous Powell River Boys Choir. The choir offered training in music reading, stage deportment and choral performance. It wasn't long until the choir was performing concerts and touring. In 1978 the choir joined the boys for their first LP recording. Since then, many singers have developed their choral skills and continued singing in advanced choirs in the program.





ILDIKO KELLY

Ildiko Kelly fell in love with Powell River (and her husband) while participating in Kathaumixw on two occasions with two different Hungarian choirs. Ms Kelly received her early training in Hungary and after immigrating to Canada continued her music studies at Malaspina University College and the Toronto Conservatory of Music in Canada. In addition to conducting the Powell River Girls Choir, Ildiko teaches piano and voice the Powell River Academy of Music. In addition to her solo performances Ildiko sings in the Academy Chamber Choir.

Chor Musica

Chor Musica is male voice community choir comprised of 55 singers. Formed in 1998 by Pacifica Papers (Powell River Division) the choir provides an opportunity for men to explore and perform a variety of music written for the male choir. In their short history the choir has become popular with its audience. In 2007, the choir performed at the 3rd International Male Voice Festival in Cornwall, England. The choir is conducted by Don James with the assistance of Richard Olfert, piano and Walter Martella vocal coach.



DON JAMES, CM

Don James, CM is founder and artistic director of the Powell River Academy of Music, the International Choral Kathaumixw and the Symphony Orchestra Academy of the Pacific. While completing his studies in orchestral conducting at the University of Washington, his work in opera led to an intense interest in vocal



music. Under his direction, Academy choirs have been awarded prizes and recognition from the Canadian and European Broadcasting Corporations and have been heard in concert and on radio and television in the Americas, Asia and Europe. THE KATHAUMIXW CHOIRS

Aurora (Young Adelaide Voices), Australia

From its inception in 1998, Aurora (Young Adelaide Voices) has lead a dynamic and fulfilling musical odyssey, educating, inspiring and challenging young choristers to sing their hearts out and experience music-making at its finest. Founded by Artistic Director Deborah Munro and Margaret Lange, the Choir has gone from



strength to strength, developing and evolving whilst still maintaining the strong and vibrant ethos of learning, caring and sharing a love of music and singing. The world-class excellence of Aurora (Young Adelaide Voices) has been witnessed in performances at many prestigious events and venues both overseas and in Australia. The Senior Vocal Ensemble that is travelling to Powell River has been in existence for only five years. It is a chamber group of experienced choristers who perform challenging music from Australian

works to contemporary classical to pop, folk and early music.

CHRISTIE ANDERSON

Christie Anderson is a singer and conductor and has worked with choirs and choral music for the past 12 years. In 2009 she began as Artistic Director of Young Adelaide Voices, one of Australia's premier choral schools and she is the tutor of YAV's Second Concert Choir and the Senior Vocal Ensemble. Christie has been a core member of Adelaide Chamber Singers for many years and was at Kathaumixw in 2006 when they won the coveted title of "Choir of the World at Kathaumixw."



Åarhus Pigekor, Denmark

Åarhus Pigekor consists of approximately 35 girls, aged 16-25 years. When entering the choir, the girls usually have a lot of vocal experience—often from other choirs at Åarhus Music School, since this is where Åarhus Girls Choir



has its base. The history of the choir goes back to the 1940's. and the choir got its current name in 2002 after winning the competition "Sangerdyst fra Kyst til Kyst" ("Battle of Choirs, from Coast to Coast"), which among the Danish choral community is considered to be the unofficial Danish championship for children's and

youth choirs. Within the last 5 years Århus Girls Choir has achieved the following: 2003: Gold Diploma, 9th International Choir Competition in Budapest, Hungary; 2006: Gold Medal, World Choir Games in Xiamen, China; 2008: Participation in the opening concert at

the World Choir Symposium in Denmark

HELLE HØYER MOGENSEN

Ms Mogensen was educated at the Royal Academy of Music, Åarhus, in 1984. Within the last 25 years she has been music teacher at Åarhus Music School and the conductor of several mixed and children and girls choirs. She has also very often been instructor for conducting seminars and workshops for choirs.



Cardston Girls Choir, Canada

As ambassadors of Southern Alberta, the Cardston Girls Choir have enjoyed meeting other people and sharing their love of choral singing with a large variety of audiences. They have not only received many awards and invitations, but recognition for their musical integrity and impeccable discipline. Their program includes music from past centuries to modern contemporary with an emphasis



on new Canadian choral repertoire. The girls also enjoy entertaining their audiences with a varied program combining music and choreography. Cardston, Alberta, home of the first Canadian Mormon temple, is nestled in the foothills of the Rocky Mountains and is only a few minutes north of the Canadian/American border. Immediately to the north of

our community lies the Blood Indian Reserve, the largest reserve in Canada. A majority of the population in this area are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and was settled by the early Mormon pioneers at the turn of the century. It is a cultural base distinct from the rest of the country.


LESLIE MCMAHEN DITTMANN

Christ the King Church Choir, Uganda

Christ the King Church Choir of Kampala, Uganda will celebrate its 80th anniversary in August 2010. It has over 90 members who sing and lead the

CARRIE TENNANT




HWEI-MIN LU


ANNE-MARIE CABUT


NADINE HÉBERT

tant director of the University Choir during her studies and had the honor of directing the renowned Quatuor Arthur-LeBlanc. She was also a member of Les Muses, a female vocal quartet, which acted as Acadian ambassadors while performing throughout Canada and Europe.

Juventus Vocalis, Germany

Founded in 1987 by Artistic Director, Judith Janzen, Juventus Vocalis celebrates its 22nd Season of musical excellence, performing with an artistry that inspires audiences and critics alike. Juventus Vocalis exists to enrich the lives of the singers, their families and the community. The children are challenged to attain choral excellence, develop commitment, confidence and self discipline, and to experience the beauty



of folk music. Musicianship and friendship are attained through this rich choral experience of a lifetime. There are four levels to the Juventus Vocalis choir program, building increasingly complex musical skills in melody, rhythm, harmony, and improvisation. The

Concert Choir is the main performance and touring ensemble with children age 10 to 19. In weekly rehearsals, the singers are challenged to new heights of musical sophistication through the study of high quality repertoire from unison to four part harmony. Juventus Vocalis trains its members in healthy singing technique through individual vocal coaching, choral performance, presentation and staging techniques. Performance opportunities within the community and tours—na-

tional and abroad—are an important enrichment to the training these advanced singers receive.

JUDITH JANZEN

Co-Founder and Artistic Director of the Children's and Youth Choir Juventus Vocalis, Ms Janzen is no stranger to the choral community. Since 1987 she has nurtured young singers through her acclaimed work with children's choirs and vocalists. Born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, she began her vocal and piano training at age seven.



Pursuing her childhood passion of becoming a singer, she continued advanced studies in singing at the University of Music in Detmold, Germany, with a scholarship from the Canada Arts Council. Here she completed her Concert Exam "summa cum laude" with Theo Lindenbaum.

Komorni Zbor Megaron, Slovenia

Komorni Zbor Megaron was founded in 2003 at the initiative of former singers of the Ljubljana Diocesan Classical Gymnasium choirs. The choir has been conducted by composer Damijan Močnik since its inception. They have performed Benjamin Britten's cantata The World of the Spirit and Gustav Mahler's Sym-



phony No. 2 Resurrection with the RTV Slovenia Symphony. The choir also performed across Slovenia and abroad. In Munich (Germany) with the Munich Symphony Orchestra and at the Royal Conservatory at The

Hague (the Netherlands) as a demonstration choir for conducting students. It has also given concerts in Germany (Stuttgart, Berlin), Belgium (Brussels), Austria (Graz) as well as in Slovakia (Nitra, Trenčín). The choir took part in national competitions Naša Pesem (Our Song) where it was awarded golden and silver plaque and at the international competition Maribor 2006 where it won the seventh place. In March 2009, it participated at the 5th International Competition for Young Choral Conductors in Ljubljana.



DAMIJAN MOČNIK

Damijan Močnik (1967) lives in Cerklje, a small town in Upper Carniola, Slovenia. He completed his studies at the Music gymnasium (1986) before continuing in composition at the University of Ljubljana's Academy of Music. A student of Dane Škerl, he graduated with distinction in 1991. Since receiving his degree, he attended many seminars, symposiums and master classes abroad, including one with renowned Swedish choral conductor Eric Ericson. Močnik since 1993 teaches music and is the choral

conductor and artistic leader at the Diocesan Classical Gymnasium (sector of St. Stanislavs' Institution) in Ljubljana, where he has carried out a variety of innovative approaches to music education.

The One Human Family Gospel Choir features chapters in the US and Canada and aims to develop bonds of friendship across racial, religious, cultural, age, gender and socioeconomic lines with music serving as the initial bond to 'unite the world, one song at a time.'




ERIC DOZIER

The New Zealand Secondary Students' Choir has been in existence since 1986. Every two years, approximately 55 of New Zealand's most promising school-aged singers are selected via nationwide auditions to join the choir for a two year period. The choir gathers every school holidays for vocal and musical training, rehearsals and public performances. At the end of each two year period, the choir travels to an international festival or competition. At the



2004 International Choral Kathaumixw, the NZSSC gained First Place Youth Choir, First Place Adult Mixed Choir and First Place Folk & Cultural Traditions. We are delighted to have the chance

to return to Powell River for this amazing festival. The mission and goals of the New Zealand Secondary Students' Choir include: the nurture and development of talent; experiences which will result in a life-long love of music; an opportunity to excel both as a group and individually in musical achievements beyond those available through their schools; to develop a sense of self-confidence and poise through example, training and performance and a desire for excellence in choral singing; to enhance each choir member's appreciation of our world's rich musical and cultural heritage.



ANDREW WITHINGTON

Andrew Withington, from Christchurch, New Zealand, was appointed Musical Director of the NZSSC in late 2008, but has worked with the choir previously for many years as assistant conductor. Andrew has a Bachelor of Music degree with First Class Honours in conducting children's choirs, orchestration and analysis from the University of Canterbury, where he was also awarded the prestigious Vernon Griffith's Prize in

Musical Leadership. After three years teaching, he returned to University and gained a Masters Degree in Music, majoring in Choral Conducting, while studying with Dr Karen Grylls at Auckland University.

For 27 years, the internationally-acclaimed Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir (PEBCC) has been offering youth from San Francisco's East Bay an outstanding program of choral training and performance. With concert tours to more than twenty-five nations, and sponsorship of the Golden Gate International Children's Choral Festival (the oldest and only international children's choral competition in the United States), the Choir is vigorously engaged in the global community of choral ensembles. 


has commissioned and premiered 26 new works by 16 living composers, has won numerous first prize awards new music for international competitions, and engages in a never-ceasing exploration of innovative repertoire from around the world.

ROBERT GEARY

Robert Geary, co-founder of Piedmont East Bay Children's Choirs, is a champion of contemporary music. Geary and his choirs have won numerous international and national awards. He has received the ASCAP award for Adventurous Programming multiple times. Among his personal achievements Geary received an award for Outstanding Conductorial Achievement in Giessen, Germany (1997); a special award for interpretation in Miedzyzdroje, Poland (1998); the International Peace Child Medal for his role as cofounder of the Golden Gate International Children's Choral Festival (1993); the KDFC Music Educator of the Year in 2002; and the Lois B. Rawlings Educational Inspiration award in 2003.

Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir Ancora, United States



Ancora is the Choir's select young women's ensemble from the Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir in the San Francisco area of the United States. Comprising just 19 members, Ancora performs challenging repertoire of a cappella works, often singing in 8 or more parts. Most of the group's members have been part of PEBCC for 6-10 years or more. They have commissioned and premiered new works by Kui Dong, Eric Tuan, Chris Hecht, Mark Winges and others.



ROBERT GEARY

Robert Geary's choirs have performed for radio, television, opera, symphony and music festivals nationally and internationally. Geary also has prepared his choirs for some of the world's leading conductors, including Helmuth Rilling, Robert Shaw, Kurt Herbert Adler, Edo de Waart, Krzysztof Penderecki, Herbert Blomstedt, Dale Warland and Kent Nagano.

The Persephone Singers, Canada

The Persephone Singers of Whitehorse, Yukon is a select women's choir founded by Rachel Grantham in 1999. The conductor is Barbara Chamberlin and the accompanist is Cheryl Wishart. The choir varies in number from 20 to



30 singers depending on enrolment after a successful audition. Repertoire ranges from traditional and contemporary folk songs to art music of every period in Western music beginning with the Middle Ages as well as world music.

BARBARA CHAMBERLIN

Barbara Chamberlin has a B. Mus, vocal performance from Lewis & Clark College, Portland, Oregon and has been a singer, performer, and teacher for many years, both in Whitehorse and in the Pacific Northwest. She has appeared on CMT, Breakfast TV, Bravo, and toured internationally as a performer/songwriter. She grew up the daughter of a choir director and has always loved anything to do with voice. This has helped her transition to becoming the Whitehorse Community Choir's acting



conductor in 2005, when she founded the Neptunes, the mostly men's choir. She is continually exploring and learning both conducting and voice, attending two years at the BC Choral conducting class and studying with Bruce Pullen (UBC), Adam Con (U of Georgia Southern), and Bruce Browne (PSU).

Powell River Chorus, Canada

The Powell River Chorus is a non auditioned community choir celebrating 53 years of singing. The Chorus not only presents formal concerts in Powell River but also appears at many community events. They have travelled throughout British Columbia and enjoyed a concert tour in Europe a few



years ago. The Chorus has won recognition in regional and national competitions.

WALTER MARTELLA

Walter Martella, a charter member of the Powell River Boys Choir, returned to his home town to conduct choirs where he began his musical training. A graduate of the University of Victoria, Mr Martella furthered his conducting studies with Don James and Dr Elmer Iseler. He is an accomplished trumpet soloist and jazz pianist. As well as conducting the Boys Choir and the Academy Singers he is also director of the Powell River Community Band.



Surrey Youth 'Chamber Choir', CANADA

The award-winning Surrey Youth 'Chamber Choir' was founded in September 2002 by director, Stephen Horning as a special project of the Surrey Cho-



ral Arts Project Society, an 'umbrella' to the Surrey Children's Choir (founded in 1992). The Surrey Youth 'Chamber Choir' is a consistent gold medal winner at Greater Vancouver festivals. Adjudicator Gerald Van Wyck, Vancouver Community College, told them "you are one of the best children's choirs in Canada". These exuberant young voices are heard often at civic and community events and have appeared live on CBC Radio. The 'Chamber Choir' received Gold Standing at

Musicfest Canada in 2005. Adjudicator Malcolm Edwards of the University of Alberta had this to say about the choir: "Your choir resides at the highest level, level five, which is artistry. This is the level trod by the musical saints and I thank you for being the choir to end my time here at Musicfest. In 2008 the Surrey Youth Chamber Choir attended the International Choral Kathaumixw and received first prize (Equal Voices) and second prize (Chamber Choir).



STEPHEN HORNING

Stephen Horning, B.Mus, Ed.Dip. graduated from the University of Victoria in 1978 majoring in composition, piano, and choral studies and subsequently has taken master classes in choral conducting with Eric Erickson, Elmer Eisler, Bruce Pullen, John Tut-

tle, Doreen Rao, Jean Ashworth Bartle and Sir David Willcocks. Mr Horning taught twelve years in the Campbell River School District where he founded the Campbell River Children's Choir and conducted the North Island Choral Society. Since moving to the lower mainland in 1989 to teach in the Surrey School District, Stephen has been appointed conductor of the Douglas College Children's Choir, has directed the Surrey District Honour Children's Choir (1991-92, 1997-98 and 2002-03) and is in demand as a clinician and adjudicator. In 2008, Stephen received a Surrey Civic Treasure Award for his contribution to the enhancement of Surrey as the Cultural Capital of Canada 2008.

The Sta. Teresa College Cherubin, Philippines

The St. Teresa College high school department choir known as Cherubim was first established as a church choir. It was only in 1994 when the school decided to join various competitions. Cherubim's first competition was the Division level Sayawit. It received first place and eventually represented the



Batangas Division in the First Regional Sayawit where the group earned the Best Dance Award, placed third over-all and has never been defeated in the high school category in the Division of Batangas since then. In the national scene, the STC Cherubim represented Calabarzon in the National Finals of

National Music Competitions for Young Artists in 2005, and recently, was awarded Gold III and eventually won the championship in the Malaysian Choral Eisteddfod VII held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia last June 2009. Not just singers but performers in the real sense of the word, the members strive to maintain a distinctive style, sincerity and character, qualities that would make them one of the enduring and ranking youth choirs and artists of its community and country as well.



AURELIO D MANALO JR

Aurelio D Manalo, Jr is a computer engineer by education, an accountant by profession, a journalist in practice, sports enthusiast and a musician by heart. He received his college degree at Mapua Institute of Technology and his masters at De La Salle University and his music rudiments in University of Sto. Tomas under the auspices of NAMCYA Foundation. Under his baton, the STC Children's Choir, the STC Cher-

ubim, the STC Faculty Chorale and the Our Mother of Perpetual Help Parish Youth Ensemble of which he is the resident conductor, have been exceptional year after year in many choral competitions. This man of vision never tires of building not just an ordinary group but a family where everyone can develop into something new, something different, something extraordinary and something that will bring him/her to the fullest.

University Community Children's Choir, Canada

The University Community Children's Choir (UCCC) was formed in September 2007 for children in the vibrant community surrounding the Univer-



sity of British Columbia in Vancouver, BC, Canada. The choristers' shining faces illustrate Canada's amazing cultural diversity; its members have come from every continent of the world except Antarctica! In its first year, the Choir won first in its class at the 2008 Kiwanis Music Festival in Vancouver and was runner-up at the provincial level. Now in its third season, the UCCC looks forward to performing concerts with the UBC Women's Choir and the Vancouver Youth Symphony Orchestra.

CHARISSA BAGAN

Charissa Bagan holds a Bachelor of Music from the University of Toronto and has studied intensively with renowned choral conductor, Doreen Rao. Currently, Charissa teaches Musicianship at UBC while completing a Masters in Choral Conducting. Last summer, Charissa was selected to participate in a master-class with Swedish conductor Fred Sjöberg at Festival 500 in Newfoundland.



Viva La Bella, Czech Republic

Viva la bella is a youth choir that has been performing in Slavonice, Czech Republic, since 1985. The choir currently has 30 members ranging in age



from 10 to 22 . The repertoire consists of classical music, Czech folk music, dance and spiritual songs. Our choir has achieved significant success at many choir contests and participated in international music festivals in Germany, France, Austria, and Slovakia. The choir director is Vlastimil Burkart, the piano accompanists are Katerina Hejlova and Ivana Sedova. The soloists are Josefina Zampova and Antonie Zampova, instrumental accompanists are Vojtech Trcka and Stepan Trcka.

VLASTIMIL BURKART

Vlastimil Burkart is a music teacher and choir leader at the local Music School in Slavonice. He graduated from the School of Music where he studied accordion and piano. Besides teaching and choir music arrangement he performs and a concert musician and piano accompanist. Under his leadership, the choir participates in competitions and shows in the Czech Republic as well as in concert performances abroad.



Youth Choir Laurus, FINLAND

The Youth Choir Laurus was founded in 1995. Currently there are about forty girls aged 12-22 all of whom are actively involved in music. From its inception the choir has been singing under the direction of Heidi Harinen. The choir's repertoire contains domestic and foreign art music from different ages as well as folk music from different countries usually performed a cappella.



The choir has co-operated with the chamber orchestra of the Music Institute of Vantaa. It has successfully taken part in choir events in Europe and enjoys a week-end camp twice a year. It have given concerts in Prague and Paris, attended festivals in Italy, Ireland and Belgium where it received the first prize at the Neerpert Festival. At The Tampere Vocal Music Festival 2001 Laurus got three silver, 2003 one gold and 2007 two gold awards. In 2007 the choir participated in the Loiste festival and the International Sympaatti festival in Finland. In 2007 - 2008 the Finnish Broadcasting Company YLE named Laurus as the Youth Choir of the Year.
