[Sean Bickerton: Notes from Powell River](#)

Last week I traveled to Powell River to present the biannual International Choral Kathaumixw with CMC BC's Certificate of Excellence, the second ever issued, deeming them a Centre of Excellence for their extraordinary contribution to Canadian music.

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I had the pleasure of making the presentation to founder Don James in front of an audience of more than 2600 on the final gala concert last Saturday. I was proud to be able to mention to the audience that William Orr, Curator of our Digital Archives, and my esteemed predecessor, Colin Miles, were both also at this year's Kathaumixw, and that Colin has attended all but one since its founding 34 years ago.

Kathaumixw is extraordinary, bringing both adult choirs and hundreds of young people from all over the world, this year alone from Cuba, South Africa, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Hungary, Australia, New Zealand, Austria, and many North American cities including Atlanta, Phoenix, San Francisco, Vancouver, and Portland.

One of the standouts was Sweet Scarlet, a smoking hot all-woman sextet from Vancouver, who won the Dr. Elmer Iseler Prize for Best Performance of a Canadian work (*Three Ways to Vacuum Your House - Part 1* by Stephen Hatfield), pictured here with yours truly!

[International Choral Kathaumixw](#)

Since 1984, the people of Powell River, BC have been the founders, organizers and hosts of the biennial International Choral Kathaumixw. [Kathaumixw is a Coast Salish word meaning "a gathering together of different peoples"]. Last week was the occasion of the 17th such festival - this year a place for sharing of talents between choral musicians from Africa, Europe, New Zealand, Australia, Hong Kong, Taiwan, and North America. The Canadian Music Centre BC Region was represented by Regional Director Sean Bickerton who made a presentation to the people of Powell River recognizing their contribution to world musical culture.

The earliest dated record of Kathaumixw in the digital archive is the [program from 1988](#). Even by the third festival, the current program framework was in place: gala opening and closing concerts, choral competitions adjudicated by local and international experts, and daily performances by participating choirs. As this year, there were performances of several compositions by CMC Associate Composers including the Kathaumixw Anthem for massed choir, commissioned specifically for the festival, and *Hymn to Freedom* by [Oscar Peterson](#), which has been sung at the closing ceremony at every festival since. At the inaugural Kathaumixw in 1988, [Peter Berring](#) was the official composer of the Kathaumixw

Anthem. In 1994 the British Columbia Choral Federation commissioned BC Associate Composer [Tobin Stokes](#) to write the current Anthem, *The Spacious Firmament*.

This year's audience was especially moved by music representing folk and cultural traditions. Performances by the Bloemfontein Children's Choir (South Africa), the Kinder & Jugendsingakademie (Graz Austria), and the New Zealand Secondary Students' Choir (the Guest Choir this year) were especially noteworthy. The latter group were highly effective ambassadors for music of the indigenous peoples of New Zealand. Stephen Hatfield's *Tjak!*, performed by the Wah Yah College Kowloon Boys Choir (winners of the 2016 Choir of the World at Kathaumixw) was a powerfully engaging composition, influenced by the indigenous cultures of Bali. [An undated program](#) from the period when Peter Berring was the Kathaumixw composer includes the libretto for a performance of his *Song [Speech] of the Salish Chief* by the Elmer Iseler Singers, Osnabruckner Jugendchor and Powell River Youth Choir. Perhaps the enthusiastic response to performance of such music and the presentation of a totem pole to the 2016 Choir of the World at Kathaumixw by the Tla'amin Nation represent an invitation for Canadians to encourage composition of music that expresses the cultural experiences of our own First Nations Peoples.

[Recollections: In Celebration of Powell River's International Choral Kathaumixw](#)

Twenty years ago, in the summer of 1996, I was a 15-year-old cellist in the Vancouver Youth Symphony Orchestra. That year, the VYSO's Senior Division, led by music director [Arthur Polson](#), had been invited to attend the International Choral Kathaumixw as Orchestra-in-Residence. Over the course of the festival, we performed several classic repertoire pieces with mass choir, including the big featured work that year, Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana*.

Although Mr. Polson had always made a point of programming an eclectic array of works by his favourite mid-20th century composers, Kathaumixw was one of my first experiences hearing and playing music by Canadian

composers. I still fondly remember the Kathaumixw anthem *The Spacious Firmament* by Tobin Stokes, which is still performed at the festival to this day.

One day, I heard a choir in the main hall rehearsing a piece that immediately grabbed my attention. When they finished, some friends and I pulled the conductor aside and asked him about the music they had just sung. As it turned out, the piece was *Feller from Fortune* by Harry Somers, and the conductor none other than the great Elmer Iseler himself. Dr. Iseler very kindly and enthusiastically spent a few minutes telling us about the piece and the composer, who was then still living. The Elmer Iseler Singers have long been closely associated with the choral music of Harry Somers, having recorded a fine album, Sacred & Profane Somers, now available on the CMC's own Centrediscs label. The Elmer Iseler Singers have also had a longstanding association with Kathaumixw, having regularly attended the festival since the very beginning.

At the time, of course, I didn't understand the significance of having an audience with this legendary figure in Canadian musical history. Looking back, this brief meeting was made even more special by the fact that Elmer Iseler was attending the festival for the last time. Sadly, he passed away less than two years later at the age of 70.

The VYSO, however, did attend the next Kathaumixw in 1998, and I enjoyed my second visit every bit as much as the first. I am grateful for my two summers at Kathaumixw, which I count as some of the happiest times of my youth. My experiences there notably also contributed to my life-long passion for music by Canadian composers.
